ART COURSES

Art I

A100 (A600 Sem 2) Grade 9, 10, 11,12
 No prerequisite 0.5 credit
 Semester course; offered both semesters

This course focuses on the elements and principles of design and composition. Students will participate in a variety of studio activities, which may include (but are not limited to) drawing, painting, printmaking, and collage. Skills and knowledge are further developed through art criticism, art history, and aesthetics.

Visual Arts I

PA16X Grade 9,10,11, 12

PA16Y 0.5 credit

No prerequisite

Semester course; offered both semesters

This course explores the visual arts of painting, sketching, and sculpture in a studio-based, hands-on environment. Students are expected to compile and display a portfolio of work to the public.

ART II

A601 Grade 9, 10, 11,12

Prerequisite: Art I with a passing grade 0.5 credit

Semester course; offered both semesters

Students who enjoyed Art I and wish to continue their art education are encouraged to take Art II. Students will participate in a variety of studio activities, which may include (but are not limited to) drawing, painting, printmaking, and collage. Students will build on the skills and knowledge learned in Art I while participating in more challenging studio projects. This course focuses on the studio production with art history, art criticism, and aesthetics as reinforcing concepts.

Visual Arts II

PA26X Grade 9,10, 11, 12

PA26Y 0.5 credit

Prerequisite: Visual Arts I with a passing grade

Semester course; offered both semesters

This course explores the visual arts of illustration, animation, and modeling using the various software applications. Students are expected to compile and display a portfolio of work to the public.

Art III

A201

Prerequisite: Art II with a passing grade Grade 10, 11, 12

Semester course; offered both semesters 0.5 credit

Motivated art students who enjoyed Art I and Art II are encouraged to take Art III. Students will participate in a variety of studio activities, which may include (but are not limited to) drawing, painting, printmaking, and collage. Art III students will work with the instructor to create projects that build their skill while focusing on the student's individual artistic goals. Student and teacher will work collaboratively.

Advanced Studio

A105 Grade 10,11,12
 Prerequisite: Art III for Drawing or Painting 0.5 credit
 emphasis & Ceramics II for
 Ceramics emphasis & Ceramics II
 Semester course; offered both semesters

Serious art students will work with their instructor to create a well-rounded art portfolio representing a variety of media. Course content is student driven instructor guidance. Personal artistic exploration and honing of skills are just some of the outcomes of this unique classroom experience.

Digital Studio

A510 (0.5 credit; offered Sem 1 only) Grade 10,11,12
A511 (1.0 credit; full year course) 0.5 to 1 credit
 Prerequisite: Art II

This course focuses on the latest digital technology as it applies to art and design. Course content is student driven with instructor guidance. Students will learn about digital media as an art tool in both the fine arts and digitally oriented careers. Software programs used (but not limited to) are Illustrator and Photoshop.

Digital Imaging (Photography)

PA15X Grades 10, 11,12
PA15Y 0.5 credit
 Prerequisite: Art II with a passing grade

This course focuses on the elements and principles of photographic design, composition, development, and presentation. Computer based instruction assists students in design and application. Students are expected to compile and display a portfolio of work to the public.

Photography

A220 (A820 Sem 2) Grade 9,10, 11, 12
 No prerequisite: Art I recommended 0.5 credit
 Semester course; offered both semesters

This course focuses on the elements and principles of design and composition. Students will capture their favorite subjects on black and white film and digital photography. Students will learn to use lighting to their advantage, develop film, and print their own pictures.

3-D1

A206 Grade 9, 10, 11, 12
 No prerequisite 0.5 credit
 Semester course; offered both semesters

Students will study the elements and principles of design as they apply to the 3D art. Students will learn about different cultures and gain a better understanding of the purpose of art historically through studio experiences.

Ceramics I

A102 (A602Sem2) Grades 9, 10,11,12
 Semester course; offered both semesters 0.5 credit

In this course, students study the basic hand-building techniques of ceramic design and construction. They will also study decorative and glazing techniques. The history of ceramics is also an important part of this course, along with the development of critical thinking and evaluation skills.

Ceramics II

A103 (A1202Sem2) Grades 9, 10,11,12
 Semester course; offered both semesters 0.5 credit

Students continue their study of the basic ceramic forms made with hand-building techniques. In addition, they will learn wheel-throwing techniques used to create simple vessels. Decorative and glazing techniques, as well as art history and self-evaluation, will continue to be important in the student's artistic development.

AP Studio (offered only at Proviso East)

A310 Grades 11, 12
 Prerequisite: Art I, II, III, and/or 1 credit
 Department approval
 (offered only at East)
 Year Course

AP Studio prepares serious art students for college level coursework in the Arts. They will learn how to assemble slide portfolio of their work that can be used for the AP Studio assessment. Many colleges also require a slide portfolio for admission and scholarship consideration related to the Arts in a variety of fields, such as architecture, graphic design, photography, and traditional studio. Preparing a slide portfolio and cohesive body of work is an essential skill that any serious art student must have to effectively compete for college and career opportunities in

Independent Study In Fine Arts

A501 Grades 11, 12
 Prerequisite: Departmental approval One 0.5 to 1 credit
 or Two semester course

Independent study must be appropriately designed and approved. The course will cover the knowledge and skills identified by the student working in cooperation with the selected faculty member. See Independent Study under the Alternative School Center and Innovative Programs.

Theatre

PA14X Grades 9,10,11,12
PA14Y
 Prerequisite:

This course focuses on performance-based development of acting skills. All aspects of the theatre are emphasized and there are a minimum number of performances required per year for successful completion of this course.

MUSIC COURSES

Beginning Chorus

C317 Grade 9, 10, 11,12
 No prerequisite Year course 1 credit
 Semester course; offered both semesters

The freshman choruses focus on fundamentals of sight-reading, diction, and vocal blend. Choir robes are provided at no charge to members of the class. The course offers a limited amount of performance experience.

Beginning Band

C341 Grade 9,10,11, 12
 No prerequisite 1 credit
 Year course

Beginning Band offers students beginning instruction in playing skills on any standard instrument in the concert band. Instruments are furnished at no charge to members of the class. Students must purchase their own mouthpieces as a cost of approximately \$25.00.

Instrumental Music

PA10X Grade 9, 10, 11,12
PA10Y 0.5 credit
 No Prerequisite
 Semester course; offered both semesters

This course introduces the principles and techniques for playing musical instruments within a structured ensemble performance environment. Instruments are based on student choices from the string, wind, and percussion families. There are a minimum number of performances required per year for successful completion of this course.

Orchestra

PA10X Grade 9, 10, 11,12
PA10Y 0.5 credit
 No Prerequisite
 Semester course; offered both semesters

This course develops advanced playing skills in the formalized setting of an orchestra. There are a minimum number of performances required per year for successful completion of this course.

Concert Band

C346 Grade 9, 10, 11,12
 Prerequisite: Audition
 Year course

Concert Band continues the development of instrumental techniques and performance at the advanced level.

Symphonic Marching Band

C345 Grade 9, 10, 11,12
 Prerequisite: Audition
 Year course

The Symphonic Marching Band presents concerts, participates in various community parades and school assembly programs, and provides shows at home games as part of the half-time entertainment. Outstanding band students may participate in the local and regional festivals and in the State Solo and Ensemble Contests.

Jazz Band

C339 Grade 10,11,12
 Prerequisite: Audition and be a 1 credit
 Instrumental band member
 Year Course

Jazz Band offers training in technique and performance to the instrumental student interested in jazz. Jazz Band students must also be members of one of the large instrumental organizations.

Chorus

PA12X Grade 9, 10,11,12
PA12Y 0.5 credit
 No Prerequisite
 Semester course; offered both semesters

This course emphasizes the development of vocal talent in a mixed ensemble. There are a minimum number of performances required per year for successful completion of this course.

Concert Chorus

C321 Grades 9, 10, 11,12
 Prerequisite: Audition and/or 1 year in 1 credit
 Beginning Mixed Chorus
 Year course

Concert Choir is open to students of all grade levels with intermediate training in performance of three and four part literature. Students must perform in a minimum of one concert each semester to receive credit towards their grade for this course. Choir robes are provided at no charge to members of the class. Students or selected students perform at school assemblies and programs, community events, choral festivals and workshops, competitions and the state and local Solo-Ensemble contests.

Madrigal Singers

C310 Grade 10, 11, 12
 No prerequisite 0.5-1 credit

The madrigal singers are a select group of 12 to 20 choral students dedicated to giving time beyond the school day rehearsals to perform music of the Renaissance period and related styles of a cappella literature. These students usually present an annual Madrigal Dinner as well as perform at school assemblies and programs, community events, choral festivals and workshops, competitions and the state and local Solo-Ensemble contests. These students must also be enrolled in one of the large performance organizations or receive special exemption from the Choir Director.

Independent Study in the Fine Arts

A501 Grades 11,12
 Prerequisite: Department approval 1 credit
 Semester course

Independent study must be appropriately designed and approved. The course will cover the knowledge and skills identified by the student working in cooperation with the selected faculty member. See Independent Study under Innovative Programs.

Music Theory

PA13X Grades 9, 10,11,12
PA13Y 0.5 credit
 No prerequisite
 Semester course; offered both semesters

This course explores music theory from both historical and modern perspectives including a study of the impact of technology on the development of music. Students will learn to write musical notation, terminology and chord progression. Tonal and atonal musical styles are emphasized.



WORLD LANGUAGES DEPARTMENT

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Study of a foreign language helps students to learn another means of expression, giving them a better understanding of their own language and increasing their job-finding potential in the work world. It also helps develop an appreciation of people whose way of life is different. Studying French, Spanish, or German is often thought of as necessary preparation for college. However, students not planning on college should not automatically exclude a foreign language from their high school program.

Knowing a foreign language today can be most useful in business, government, industry, and in one's personal life. College bound students should know that colleges have different foreign language entrance requirements. Therefore, they should contact their counselor for specific requirements at their college of choice as early as possible. More importantly, college bound students should realize that taking the same foreign language for four years will not lead to mastery, but it may exempt them from having to take a language in college or grant them college credit for what they know and can demonstrate.

Freshman who take a World Language and earn a grade of B or better will meet the 0.5 credit reading course requirement for graduation. This applies only in the freshman year at Provision.

WORLD LANGUAGE Courses

French I

L065 Grade 9,10,11, 12
MSA3121 1 credit
 No prerequisite
 Year course

This course requires no previous language experience. The course introduces students to French and the people who speak it. Units of work based upon normal conversation used by native speakers of French will help students understand the spoken language. Students practice speaking, reading, and writing French during the first year.

French II

L065 Grade 10,11, 12
MSA3221 1 credit
 Prerequisite: Successful completion of French I
 Year Course French I and II are recommended to be taken in succession.

This course is designed to improve language skills from French I so that students can use the past, present, and future to converse and present on a variety of cultural topics. Students build larger vocabularies and improve sentence structure by reading stories they will also create original conversations and compositions. Also, they will read culture selections that will improve their conversational and writing skills.

French III

L067 Grade 9,10,11, 12
 Prerequisite: Successful completion of French II 1 credit
 Year Course

This course extends student skills in the speaking of French and increases student knowledge of the customs and habits of the people who speak it. Students will participate in group discussions, in readings, and in individual and group projects. A French novel will be read.

French IV

L068 Grade 12
 Prerequisite: Successful completion of French III 1 credit
 Year Course

This course refines student abilities to speak, read, and write French. They will gain greater understanding of the people who are native speakers of French and of the places where French is spoken. Students will read a survey of Francophone literature, including two complete novels. History, geography, vocabulary, grammar, and culture will be integrated into the readings and film study.

*Students who complete this course with a final grade of C or better each semester will receive credit in French 101 and 102 at **TRITON COLLEGE** if they meet qualifying standards.

Spanish I

L080 Grade 9, 10, 11, 12
 No prerequisite 1 credit
 Year course

This course requires no previous language experience. The course introduces students to Spanish and the people who speak it. Units of work based upon normal conversation used by native speakers of Spanish will help students understand the spoken language. Students practice speaking, reading, and writing Spanish during the first year.

Spanish I Honors

L280 Grade 9, 10, 11, 12
 No prerequisite 1 credit
 Prerequisite: 8th grade placement test in Language Arts
 Year course

This is a higher level of Spanish I. It is taught at a faster pace with special emphasis on spoken and written Spanish. Students will perform activities that will lead them to continue in the honors track and take the Advanced Placement Test in Spanish IV AP. Passing the Advanced Placement Test may lead to college credit in Spanish.

Spanish II

L081 Grade 10, 11, 12
 Prerequisite: 8th grade placement test successful completion of Spanish I 1 credit
 Recommended to take Spanish I and II back to back
 Year course

This course is designed to improve language skills from Spanish I. Students build larger vocabularies and improve sentence structure; they will create original conversations and paragraphs. Also, they will read cultural selections that will improve their conversational and writing skills.

Spanish II SS

Prerequisite: Placement Test Grades 9, 10,11,12
 Year course 1 credit

This course offers a variety of challenging and stimulating features designed to increase the cultural and linguistic competency of heritage Spanish speakers. Student will achieve global understanding of the socio-cultural and historic dimensions of the Spanish-speaking world while at the same time providing ample practice in writing, vocabulary expansion, and grammatical awareness. They will also acquire cultural competency as they improve on their listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. Overall, this course is designed to prepare students' oral and written skills by focusing on Spanish culture and literature.

Spanish III

L082 Grade 11,12
 Prerequisite: Successful completion of Spanish III 1 credit
 Year Course

This course extends student skills in speaking, reading, and writing Spanish. Students read and discuss short stories and a novel in Spanish. They will also learn about the culture of Latin American Spanish-speaking countries through projects, discussions, readings, and videos.

Spanish III Hours

L085 Grade 10,11,12
 Prerequisite: Spanish II Honors 1 credit
 Or recommendation of instructor
 Year Course

This course is designed for those students who successfully completed the Spanish II Honors class. The course is taught in Spanish and focuses on developing fluency in the Spanish language. Emphasis is placed on increasing reading comprehension, understanding and using more complex language structures and refining writing skills in a variety of formats. Readings include cultural and literacy selections as well as current newspaper and magazine articles related to the Spanish-speaking world.

Spanish III SS

Prerequisite: Spanish II SS or Placement test
 Year Course

Grade 11, 12
 1 credit

Spanish III for Spanish speakers is an intermediate Spanish program especially designed for heritage Spanish speakers. This program's content-based approach provides heritage Spanish speakers with a wealth of opportunities to learn about their own country of origin, or that of their ancestors, as well as the countries of origin of all their classmates. The intended end result of this approach is that, as students delve into their roots, regardless of their ancestries, they learn to take pride in and respect not only their specific cultural heritage but also that of their classmates. The text lessons focus on individual countries, people, and events. This course helps develop heritage Spanish speakers' reading and writing skills while also placing emphasis on communication, pair and group work, learning in context, and the use of critical-thinking skills. Class includes readings as well as grammar and teacher resources.

Spanish IV

L083
 Prerequisite: Recommendation of instructor
 Year Course

Grade 11
 1 credit

This course refines student abilities to speak, read, and write in the Spanish language. Students will gain greater understanding of the Spanish-speaking world with an emphasis on Spain through a variety of readings which include literature and culture. Students will have the opportunity to participate in class discussions and oral presentations regarding themes and topics related to readings, investigations about the Spanish-speaking people and their heritage.

*Students who complete this course with a final grade of C or better each semester will receive 8 credits in Spanish 101 and 102 at TRITON COLLEGE if they meet the qualifying standards.

Spanish I

L080
 No prerequisite
 Year course

Grade 9, 10, 11, 12
 1 credit

This course requires no previous language experience. The course introduces students to Spanish and the people who speak it. Units of work based upon normal conversation used by native speakers of Spanish will help students understand the spoken language. Students practice speaking, reading, and writing Spanish during the first year.

AP Spanish IV

L086
 No prerequisite
 Prerequisite: Spanish III Honors, Spanish III SS, or credit Spanish IV or Recommendation of instructor
 Year course

Grade 11, 12
 1 credit

This course is taught in Spanish. Emphasis is placed on refining all four language skills: listening, speaking, reading and writing. This course prepares students for the AP Spanish Language exam, which is an optional exam offered in May of each school year. Emphasis is placed on

understanding and use of more complex language structures as well as increasing the students' vocabulary and knowledge of the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. Throughout the course, students will be required to express themselves in Spanish in a variety of formats. Students will become acquainted with literary works such as *El Cid* and *Don Quijote* and other literary selections.

Spanish V

L076
 Prerequisite: Spanish AP4, Spanish 4 or Recommendation of instructor
 Year course

Grade 11, 12
 1 credit

This is the final course in the Spanish language sequence. The course is taught in Spanish. The course focuses on the literature of the Spanish-speaking world and includes: short stories, poetry, drama and/or the novel. Throughout the course the students will discuss and analyze critically themes, form, and content of the reading selections. The course requires students to express themselves with some ease in the Spanish language, whether the situation requires students to speak or write.

*Students who complete this course with a final grade of C or better each semester will receive credit in Spanish 103 or 104 at TRITON COLLEGE if they meet the qualifying standards.

German I

L070
 No Prerequisite
 Year course

Grade 9,10,11,12
 1 credit

This course requires no previous language experience. The course introduces students to German and the people who speak it. Units of work based upon normal conversation used by native speakers of German will help students understand the spoken language. Students practice speaking, reading, and writing German during the first year.

German II

L071
 Prerequisite: German I
 Year course

Grade 10,11,12
 1 credit

This course is a continuation of German I. Students build larger vocabularies, learn more complex grammar, create original conversations, write paragraphs and read a short book. Cultural topics will be covered through reading and Internet activities.

American Sign Language (ASL)

L050

Grade 9, 10, 11, 12

No Prerequisite

Year Course

ASL is recognized as a distinct language by several national linguistic organizations and is accepted as a foreign language by many universities. This full year course teaches students the basics of American Sign Language through dialogues, role playing, and presentations. Students will both receptive and expressive communication skills, while learning about the deaf culture and professions where ASL is used, such as sign language interpreting.

Independent Study in World Languages

A501

Grade 11, 12

Prerequisite: Departmental approval

1 credit

One or Two semester course

Independent study must be appropriately designed and approved. The course will cover the knowledge and skills identified by the student working in cooperation with selected faculty member. See Independent Study under the Alternative School Center and Innovative Programs.
