






1. I Am Not Your Perfect Mexican Daughter by Erika L. Sánchez (ISBN: 9781524700515)

2. Aristotle and Dante Discover the Secrets of the Universe by Benjamin Alire Sáenz (ISBN: 9781442408937)








3. Dear Evan Hansen by Val Emmich (ISBN: 9780316420235)



1. The House on Mango Street, by Sandra Cisneros (ISBN: 9780679734772)




2. Stamped: Racism, Antiracism and You, by Jason Reynolds and Ibram X. Kendi (ISBN: 9780316453691)

A book to help us better understand why we are where we are. A book about






3. I Am Malala, by Malala Yousafzai and Christina Lamb (ISBN: 9780316322409)

4. Like Water for Chocolate, by Laura Esquivel (ISBN: 9780365420174)




2. Just Mercy, by Bryan Stevenson






1. How to Read Literature Like a Professor, by Thomas C. Foster
