Dr. Patrick Hardy has never been one to shy away from hard work. Just look at his resume and you will see numerous degrees including a master's degree from Harvard University. He knows the power of an education, and he wants his students to realize that power as well. This year will be no different with his plans to take East to the next level academically.

He said the largest change students will see this school year is in instruction because so many teachers will be using the Competency Based Education (CBE) model. Juniors and seniors will still get grades, but sophomores and freshmen will see numbers on their report cards and not grades.

This past summer, many freshmen found themselves going to extended learning because they had more work to do, but on the bright side this will benefit them. "We are going to graduate better students, and we owe that to them," he said.

In regards to CBE, he said, "I want to start off slow, so the transition isn't too much for the students."

Got Game? Basketball Tryouts Ahead By Marquez Washington

For any athlete looking for what it takes to be a part of the Proviso East Basketball Team, here are some things players need to know. In an exclusive *Pageant* interview with Varsity Head Coach Donnie Boyce, he noted three important characteristics. They need to be humble, accountable, and they need to sacrifice a piece of their game for the betterment of the team, he said.

When asked does he think work ethic is more important than talent, coach said, "Work ethic is more important because everybody has talent, but the

work ethic is different in great players who are willing to go the extra mile."

Attitude is also very important, he said, adding that "a bad attitude is like a cancer; you don't want it to spread."

To sum it up, the top five traits are work ethic, inner drive, dedication, skill set, and good attitude.

Up to 60 athletes typically try out for the varsity team, but only 25 to 30 make it, and they only dress 15. The team keeps 25 to 30 players just in case of injury, ineligibility, or a player quits. There are four levels: varsity, junior varsity, sophomore, and freshman. The team practices every day except Sundays.

Tryouts for all levels are after school on Nov. 4 in the fieldhouse.

He also said that CBE will benefit both students and teachers by making sure students earn their grades and by forcing teachers to teach students the skills they need. "I want to make sure the grade the students get matches up to their SAT scores. I don't want my students to have A's and B's and an 800 on their SAT scores. That doesn't make sense to me."

As far as advance placement classes, Dr. Hardy hopes more students will be taking AP classes not just for the academics but also for them to put hard work in their studies. "I want kids to know what hard work really is," he said.

When looking at schoolwide goals, even though the graduation rate has gone up steadily over the last five years, East did not meet the state requirements of 75 percent. The school came up short with a 74 percent graduation rate. He is working to make sure that by next year, the school reaches its goal. "We don't have a choice; we have to reach 75 percent by next year."

Dr. Hardy said the school has come a long way since he took over. He said the last battle is academics. By accomplishing this goal, graduation rates will increase as well as SAT scores.

"Academics is the last battle. We are fighting the last war. We think that is going to make our school soar. I think Proviso East is going to be off the charts."

Remembering Proviso East Alum Fred Hampton

Fred Hampton grew up in Maywood and became an essential leader in the Black Panther Party. Fifty years ago, he was killed by Chicago police, who were working under the auspices of the Office of the Cook County State's Attorney. His murder came after his tireless activism.

Hampton advocated for the development of a "Rainbow Coalition" of people from all backgrounds who would fight together against oppression. He was deeply invested in the civil rights movement and worked to bring social programs for all.
