Reading Journal (50 points)

- Choose 10 chapters from the book to write about in journal entries. Each journal entry should be about one paragraph in length, 6-10 sentences.
- Arrange your entries in the order the chapters appear.
- Label each entry with the page number(s) that inspired your thoughts.
- Your notes/entries should NOT center on what happens in the story, such as giving a summary of the plot. Instead, you should focus on making deeper connections such as:
 - Ideas that the chapter inspires or makes you think about
 - Connections that you can make to other books, stories, or other texts
 - Thoughts regarding how the character(s) are changing or remaining the same through their actions, words, and emotions
 - The language used— the tone, the word choice, the style, any literary devices you notice, the way the author writes
 - Cultural connections thoughts on how the story relates to society, culture, identity

Reading Journal Rubric: 50 points

Each chapter is worth 5 points.

TEN chapters or short stories. Be sure to indicate the TITLE of the chapter or short story.	FIVE paragraphs—each at least six sentences in length.
